

Fairfield City Council are holding a talk at Cabramatta Library in August on Chinese Australians in WWI.

For anyone who has an interest in World War I history this promises to be an interesting discussion on a little known side of Australian Multiculturalism in the early 20th Century.

The Story of my Colby Family

This is a short narrative of my Colby Family from c. 1841 till my mother Violet Minnie Jackson (nee Colby) marriage to Clifford Raymond John Jackson in 1945, there will be other family members alive still I am sure, but as yet I cannot confirm them.

The furthest I have so far is in my Colby Family is to a George Colby, according to the 1871 Census he is a Labourer aged 30 and was born in Lynn Norfolk in 1841, Lynn is now call Kings Lynn. Unfortunately after considerable research both online and a full day spent in the Norfolk Archives in Norwich I have not been able to find any further information for George. I cannot find him on the 1851 or the 1861 Censuses and he died on the 17th November 1879 in Walthamstow aged 39 years, this being before the next Census in 1881. George married Jane Staines on the 10th December 1864 in The Parish Church, Boringer, Essex; George is listed as a Railway Labourer and is aged 23 years which still ties into being born in 1841. According to the Marriage Certificate George's father was also George, of course this has not been confirmed yet. George and Jane had 8 children, Phoebe born 1865, George born 1867, Maria Jane born 1869, John James born 1871, Mary Louisa born 1873, Harry or Henry born 1875, Elizabeth born 1877 and Ellen born 1879.

Jane Staines was born on 15/5/1839 at Shelley, Essex but it seems that she was born 5 years after her father James died a sister Elizabeth was born in 1836 also illegitimate. Jane's Marriage Certificate lists her father's names as George Staines not James, the Shelley St. Peter's Church of England Parish Register list her as being the Illegitimate Daughter of Mary Staines Widow, note also that James Staines the Illegitimate Son of Jane's Daughter Maria was Baptised at the same time. Jane's mother was Mary Ann Barlow and she married James Staines on 16th April 1816 in St. Peter C of E Church Shelley, Essex and had 8 children before James died in June 1833.

Mary Ann married a George Burrell on 25th July 1841 at the Parish Church of Shelley, Essex, this is possibly the George on Jane's Marriage Certificate. There do not appear to be any legitimate children from this marriage.

Jane and George Colby's second child George was my Great Grandfather, he joined the Royal Navy initially as a boy Sailor 21st Jan 1883 at the age of nearly 16 years and as an Ordinary Seaman 31st March 1885 once he turned 18 years. When George completed his service on 2nd June 1905 he was a Chief Petty Officer, the highest non commissioned rank. He was only 38 years when he left the Navy and is listed as a pensioner on his Naval Records. In the 1911 Census he is listed as a Messenger working for the Admiralty, this was most likely a pension job as he left with a Naval Pension. He died in 1919 in London aged 53 years.

My Grandfather Leonard Colby was born on 13th October 1899 and according to his Birth Certificate his father's name was George Colby, his mother's name was Ellen Colby formerly Staines and his father's occupation was listed as General Labourer, he was actually a Petty Officer in the Royal Navy. I have not been able to find a Marriage

between George Colby and Ellen Staines or any other information about Ellen and when the 1901 census came out I found Leonard as the Adopted Son of his Grandmother Jane Colby (nee Staines). When the 1911 census came out I found Leonard listed as the son of his Uncle John James Page Colby and his wife Frances, there is no birth of a Leonard to John & Frances Colby. My mother has confirmed that that she understood that her Grandfather was a sailor but knew no other details.

Leonard joined the London and North East Railway company, (which became part of British Rail), at the age of 15 where he worked as a Porter or a Ticket Collector for over 49 years, he was not allowed to work a couple of extra months to get 50 years service as he turn 65 years he had to retire. On retirement he was presented with a Mantle Clock see photo 1, the clock is held by my cousin Ann Little (nee Naisbitt). Because of his height 4 feet 9 ½ inches and being a Railway employee who were technically exempt he did not serve in either WW1 or WW2. Leonard married Minnie Emma Soall on 4th June 1927 at St. Mary's Parish Church Cheshunt, Hertfordshire, England, Leonard was 27 years of age and Minnie was 21 years of age, Leonard is listed as a Porter and Minnie as a Domestic Servant. They had 2 know children my mother Violet Minnie and June Gwendoline. There is a possibility according to my mother that there was 3rd child, a boy, most likely Stillborn as there are no birth records for another child, this will require further research.

My mother Violet Minnie Colby was born on 15th April 1928 at 5 Bristol Park Road, Walthamstow, Essex. She attended the Holy Trinity C of E School at Tottenham and later the Green School Tottenham. When the Second World War stated Minnie, Violet and June Colby moved from Tottenham and stayed with Minnie's sister Violet Young (nee Soall) at Goffs Oak Cheshunt because of the fear of bombing, Leonard as he was working for the Railways stay in Walthamstow so that he was close to his work. This information came about from the 1939 Register which was used to produce Identity Cards and Rationing Coupons.

Unfortunately as a teenager Violet was hit by an Army Truck whilst riding her bike and has a large scar on her leg from this encounter, this has had a bearing on her health in later years.

Violet met Clifford Raymond John Jackson my father whilst working in a factory making parts for the De Havilland Mosquito aircraft. Clifford was conscripted into the British Army Royal Engineers Service No. 14061288 when he turned 18 years which was in 1945, but by the time he had finished his basic training the War was over. When he completed his training he was posted to the Occupation Force in Belgium and Germany. Before he left for Europe on the 29th September 1945 he married Violet Minnie Colby at the Ware Register Office with permission of his commanding Officer, Clifford was 18 years and Violet was 17 years. Six months later on the 23rd February 1946 their first child Enid Eileen Jackson was born, by this time Clifford was station in Europe. This story will be completed up to the present at a later date.

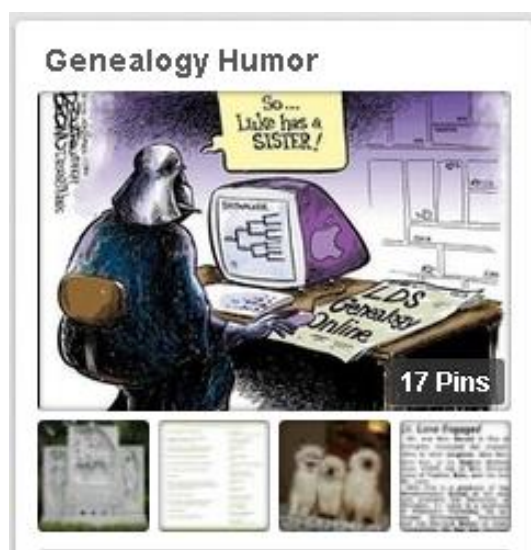
On the evening of Thursday 8th September and the afternoon of Sunday 11th September there will be a guided tour of St. Paul's Anglican Church Cobbitty's graveyard with brief talks on a number of interesting people buried there. The Thursday tour will commence at 4.30 pm and the Sunday at 3.00 pm, meet at the front entrance to the Church from the car park.

There has been quite a number of Exhibitor Table Bookings so far, we may have to put a limit on the number of Tables as we are unsure exactly how many we can fit in the Civic Centre, we may have to have some of them in the foyer area. We have been very well served by Major Sponsors, with Camden Council, Ancestry, Find My Past, NSW BDMs, Inside History Magazine, Joy Murrin, Marilyn Rowen and more. We are in the process of looking for local sponsorship for our Raffles, there is a letter drafted that can be taken to these local businesses asking for their support.

We are starting to work on an advertising campaign in the local area for the Family History Fair on Friday 9th September; this will take the form of posters that we will have displayed at local shopping centres and various other places around the Macarthur and Wollondilly areas, Newspaper article and we are looking at approaching the local schools to put in the school newsletters. We are also looking at putting articles in other magazines and newsletter in the area. Our program is close to being finalized, a preliminary program has been uploaded to our website, however we are still waiting on 2 replies but hope that to be able to finalise the program at our next meeting. We also have at least 2 standby speakers that are available should we need them and we will contact at a later date if required.

We are looking at various quotes for the Conference Bags and we will be finalising the designs and supplier at the next meeting, they will not be ordered for a little while yet and we have started working on the conference booklet, we have a couple of quotes so far based on last year's booklet, however the recent heavy flooding in Picton and the Wollondilly has damaged the facilities of our favoured printer so we may have to see what we can get done elsewhere. We are still hopeful that Ancestry will sponsor our Conference booklet as they have done for many previous years.

Device friendly website for Family History searches June 2016

The new device friendly website for family history searches has been released. You can now use your mobile phone or tablet to search for and order certificates.

Surcharge on Credit Cards

As of 1 July 2016 a surcharge will apply to all credit card payments to the Registry. The applicable rates are Visa and MasterCard 0.4% and American Express 1.4%. Surcharge rates are based on cost-recovery only. A surcharge is not payable to other methods of payment including cheque, money order, cash or EFT. You may select one of these non-surcharge methods when you pay your monthly account. The increase in the total price of a certificate will be between 21 cents and 74 cents, depending on the type of credit card used. The expense was introduced two years ago and the Registry has carried this cost during that time.



Mary Gilmore, aged 83

Dame Mary Gilmore

Mary Jean Cameron was born on 16 August 1865 at Cotta Walla near Goulburn, NSW. She campaigned for a wide range of social and economic reforms and became a prominent Australian socialist poet and journalist. In 1962 aged 97, Gilmore passed away and received the first state funeral for a writer since the death of Henry Lawson in 1922.

Her image appears in the Australian \$10 note, along with her portrait painted by the well-known Australian artist Sir William Dobell.

Ask a family history transcription agent

Family history transcription agents provide full and partial transcriptions, or verification of details. A good idea if you only need the facts, and not full certified copies of certificates.

Some Interesting details discovered during the process of indexing the British 1881 Census. (Found in the Ensign magazine of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, March 1996, p. 58.)

The wife, mother, and daughter of James Christmas were all named Mary Christmas

Frank Guest was listed as a visitor

Harriet Goodhand was listed as a domestic servant

The families of William Lovegrove, Henry Dearlove, and William Darling all lived on the same block in Oxfordshire

A woman named Rose married Robert Garden

Emma Boatwright married a seaman

Mr. Thorn lived in Rose Cottage

Robert Speed, a bus driver and post runner

Phoebe Brain, a scholar

One woman's birthplace was listed as "in stage coach between Nottingham and Derby"

John Pounder, a blacksmith

William Scales, a piano maker

Herman Hamberger, born in Greece

Curious occupations: dirt refiner, hoveller, moleskin saver, piano puncher, sparable cutter, spittle maker, tingle maker, and whim driver

Twin four-year-olds named Peter the Great and William the Conqueror

Brothers named Seaman and Landsman

The occupation of three daughters was entered as "They toil not, neither do they spin"

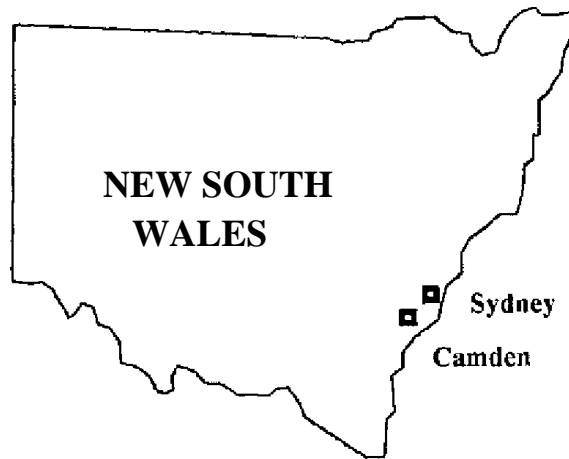
