Event: **NSW State Records Kingswood and Nearby 19th Century Heritage**

Date: Wednesday 1st November, 2017

Transport: Self drive: meet at main door of the State Archives at Kingswood at 10.00 am

Cost: \$35.00 for NT members, \$45.00 for non members

A self-drive tour starting at the State Archives at Kingswood, 161 O' Connell Street Kingswood, beginning with a simple morning tea (supplied by the Archives) at approximately 10.30am we will have a tour of the building and how you can use the information contained within.

After the end of the tour at the Archives, we will have a lunch break in the Archives grounds, please BYO own lunch and drinks.

After lunch we will head to 'The Manse', home of the Mt Druitt Historical Society, located at 23 The Avenue, Mount Druitt, also known as the Methodist Manse. The Manse was built in the 1880s by John Harris. Here we will have a guided tour of the home by the Mt Druitt Historical Society, together with an explanation of the restoration of this building by Graham Edds.

Our final journey will be to Mamre House, 181 Mamre Road Orchard Hills for Devonshire tea (included) together with a tour of Mamre house. Mamre House is an 85-hectare property at Orchard Hills in Sydney's west, part of Reverend Samuel Marsden's original South Creek farm established in 1804. Mamre Homestead, built c1820s, was the home of this colonial chaplain, magistrate and pastoralist. It was the working farmhouse of a busy rural property, a model farm which included orchards, exotic pasture and other crops.

We hope to conclude the days' tours at approximately 4.30 – 4.45pm. An information sheet will be emailed to confirmed participants about 1 week before the event, with a reminder of date, time and any relevant details concerning the upcoming event. Mrs Airdrie Martin and Mr Graham Edds are the co-ordinators of this event and will be leading you on your journey.

Friends of RookWood

The Final Twilight Tour for 2017 will be held on Sunday 19th November 2017 between 5.15pm and 7.30pm. Join the Volunteer guides for an interesting walk through our World Class heritage area.

Held in the cool of the evening, we tell stories of such people as Captain Moonlight, Jacob Pitman, Louisa Lawson to name just a few. We also tell of a murder that took place in the cemetery. As we stroll along the Serpentine Canal you will be able to see the restoration and elaborate garden plans that were a feature of the cemetery in the 19th Century. Twilight tours depart from the small pedestrian gate in East St near the corner of Railway St. Park in East St. Lidcombe.

The final Heritage Tour for 2017 will be held on Sunday 5th November from 10.00am to 12.30pm and is titled Heritage Walk Part 2 – Plague & Pestilence.

Disease and epidemics took thousands of lives in early Sydney. Measles, Scarlet Fever and Typhoid were responsible for families losing many loved ones within days or weeks of each other, and of course there was The Plague. Men returning from WW1 in 1919 brought the Influenza virus with them causing many deaths. “Cures” for some of these ailments were horrific and many doctors and Nurses died of disease contracted in the workplace. The development of the Medical Profession is also a feature of this tour. Heritage Tours depart from the front area of St Michael the Archangel chapel near the East St Lidcombe Entrance.

Costs of these tours is \$15 per person & Members \$10 per person

British newspapers for family history and other research

The British Newspaper Archive or BNA (<http://www.britishnewspaperarchive.co.uk>) is a similar online resource like Trove. Their earliest papers date from the 1700s, and scanning is ongoing. There is a list of publications covered which will assist in determining whether your family's local area is likely to be included.

BNA is rapidly building up their resources, with 820 newspapers currently included. These have been sourced from England, Scotland, Wales, Nthn Ireland and even the Republic of Ireland (which although not officially part of Britain, has been included through “a deal”).

Unfortunately, unlike Trove, access is NOT FREE. You can pay by the month, the year or to view 40 pages. You will be billed automatically unless you cancel your subscription. Using currency converter on 20 September, the cost for a year's subscription was AU\$135. For most Australians, the monthly or 40 page options are probably more cost effective.

Perhaps you could share a subscription/logon with a friend or family member. There is also the option to give a subscription as a gift.

To test the resource, they give you three free pages.
