2019 NSW & ACT Association of Family History Societies Annual Conference:

Theme: EXPLORING THE PAST

Ku-ring-gai Historical Society is hosting the **2019 Conference** for the NSW & ACT Association of Family History Societies (**Association**). The Conference will take place at Knox Grammar School on the **11th to 13th of October 2019**.

Friday 11th October will be a **free day** for anyone to attend. **Free informative lectures** on various aspects of genealogy; and more **advanced master classes** (\$10) and a family history fair, with exhibition tables including booksellers, businesses and family history societies. Master classes are the only events held on the Friday that need to be booked in advance.

The **Association Forum** will commence on **Friday 3pm**. Further details will be circulated prior to the Conference.

The Conference proper kicks off on Friday night with a "**Meet and Greet**" event for **registered participants**. The main lectures start on Saturday and continue on Sunday. Trade tables will be open during the breaks, giving participants opportunities to browse the goods and services on offer. **Registration fee** includes all sessions on Saturday and Sunday; morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea on Saturday; morning tea on Sunday; and the Meet & Greet on Friday night.

The **Association AGM** commences at 4pm. Decisions include voting on the Assn Member Societies to represent the four Regions; and determination of the composition of the Association Mgmt Comm for 2019–20.

The **Conference Dinner** will be held on Saturday night. It is an elaborate sit-down dinner, and will be held in a building overlooking the Knox oval. At night the gothic-style buildings are floodlit, so it will be a spectacular venue. There will also be a great guest speaker at the dinner, the identity of whom is a secret for now.

Influenza

After WW1, about a third of the world's people experienced a dose of the flu. This wasn't a passing URTI - the **Spanish flu pandemic** of 1918-19 killed an estimated 20 to 50 million victims. It travelled from America to the trenches and was taken home by soldiers returning from war. As it progressed, it mutated, and illness continued after the primary outbreak as it circled the world in waves. Hospitals turned people away. In some American towns, bodies collected in the streets waiting for someone to bury them. Entire families were hidden, their members too unwell to manage daily activities.

A very readable, and shocking, study of the pandemic is John Barry's book, *The Great Influenza*, 2005.

Camden News 3 July 1919

The influenza epidemic is still raging in Australia, locally its influence has been stayed considerably to what it was a fortnight ago, but still there is much sickness at various homes, and the emergency hospital at the public school, under Matron McAnene of the District Hospital, is very busy. But for this hospital and the system of home treatment inaugurated by the local authorities, Camden would have been in a sorry plight.

Too much cannot be said of the spontaneous response from all sides, and influence for good is wonderful, not the least in the way volunteers work at the Methodist School Hall depot, which is being carried on by a band of most energetic workers under the supervision of Mrs. Butler, Senior, and Mrs. Davies, and the system of relief afforded by the Red Cross depot in delivering foodstuffs, etc., to homes stricken with the disease.

USyd graduates in WWI

As WW1 memorial events draw to a close, so does a project established by the University of Sydney to expand on the memorial booklet assembled to honour graduates who had fought and died in the war.

There are some very interesting records which vary significantly in the depth of information available.

During the memorial years, a number of families provided letters and memorabilia for scanning and photography, so that their ancestor’s contribution was better recorded.

The site illuminates the contributions made by doctors (including several women) and vets to the war effort. Many of the generals were better educated than the majority of soldiers, and with very few universities in Australia, graduates of the University of Sydney made a significant contribution.

A search in the database for ‘Camden’ reveals a number of religious personnel who were educated at Camden College. But it was not located in the town of Camden.

Situated on the property 'Camden', near Newtown and Enmore. **Camden College** was an independent, Congregational Union of Australia, day and boarding school for boys from 1864 until 1877 and theological college for the training of Christian ministers from 1864 until 1974.

Camden Museum – donors and their donations

Many people with ancestors from Camden will comment during a visit, "My grandparents donated their XX to the Museum, but I don't recognise it among the collection."

During the 1960s, the Camden Historical Society dreamed of establishing a collection to record the heritage of their famous town and its people. The role of local history in helping people understand their 'place' and identify with its stories was increasingly recognised. Donations for a future Museum were collected and placed in storage.

The Museum opened in 1970. Unfortunately, detailed source information is missing for the earliest donations. However, under curator, John Wrigley, record keeping has developed from a series of cards, to spreadsheets, and now to the MOSAiC database.

Over time, research becomes more sophisticated, and the recording of donors and the stories associated with their donations has improved. In a collection of over 3,000 objects, almost 30 have Statements of Significance which record the origins, use and significance of objects within the collection. An object does not need to be rare to be significant; value is assessed against a formal set of criteria.

So, when someone asks about a donation made by their family member, direct them to a volunteer – Julie Wrigley, Anne McIntosh and Rene Rem are the most likely to be able to provide detailed information from MOSAiC. John Wrigley sometimes personally recalls the donation being received!

The files in the Museum contain newspaper clippings and event notices relating to properties, families and events in the town. Ask a Museum volunteer whether they can assist with the query.



Street Photography in Sydney

There is an excellent exhibition currently open (closes on 21 July 2019) with candid shots of many Sydneysiders and visitors to the 'Big Smoke' on display at the 'Museum of Sydney', Corner Phillip and Bridge Streets, Sydney.

I'm sure you all have in your photograph collections, albums or shoe-boxes some of these photographs showing candid-shots of our family and their friends as they went about their daily business in the city. They are great snapshots not only of people with the fashions of the day, but also the cars, the views, the shops (try reading the names) which are all visible in the background. It was big business from the 1930s through to the late 1950s however litter was to become their down-fall. In the 40's there were about 80 to 100 of these street photographers roaming around the city.

'It is hard to know who they were. Basically, anyone who could afford a camera and paper could set up as a street photographer,' said the exhibition's curator, Anna Cossu.
